

Protect Your Passwords

**Treat your password like your toothbrush –
DON'T SHARE IT!**



Keep Your Desktop Secure

- Shut down your computer when you away from the office
- Use a password protected automatic screen lock to prevent unauthorized users from viewing ePHI



Reporting Security Breaches

Report a security incident if

- Someone asks for your password or to use your login
- You suspect someone is inappropriately accessing confidential data
- You discover unauthorized or missing hardware or software

Security Do's or Don'ts

- **Sharing my password**
- **Allowing a coworker to use my login information**
- **Using a password protected screen lock**
- **Printing a screenshot with a patient name**
- **Saving an export to an unencrypted flash drive**
- **Running an email program while entering ePHI**
- **When you find a good password, keep it!**
