
Trends, Distribution, and Demographics

Direct Entry Midwives





In 2019, there were 286 actively licensed direct entry midwives providing care in Texas.

- This number represented a 27.1% increase since 2014 and a 64.4% increase since 2009.
- Relative to population growth, the size of the direct entry midwife workforce has improved by 28.6% over the past 10 years.



Within 10 years, 22.7% of the current Texas direct entry midwife workforce will be eligible for retirement.

- 6.6% of active direct entry midwives in Texas were older than 65 years of age in 2019.
- 42.0% were 40 years of age or younger.

Direct entry midwives were not evenly distributed throughout the state.

- There was a 55.7% difference between the number of direct entry midwives in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas even after controlling for population differences.
- Between border and non-border areas, the percent difference was 52.0%.
